Stages Under the Stars

Stage meets starlight in these world-famous open-air arenas:

Red Rocks Amphitheatre. This mountaintop venue is always ready to rock. Wedged between 300-foot-high prehistoric sandstone walls, builders broke ground on the amphitheatre during the 1930s as part of a Depression-era jobs and conservation program. Laborers were paid a dollar a day to carve this famous theater overlooking Denver, Colo. Since then, Red Rocks has hosted legends like The Beatles, Johnny Cash, Jimi Hendrix and Stevie Wonder.

Sydney Opera House. The iconic shell-shaped roof silhouetting the Sydney skyline has come to symbolize Australia itself. This UNESCO World Heritage site has hosted a range of performances as well as notables such as the Pope and Nelson Mandela, who spoke about forgiveness after being imprisoned for almost three decades.

Theatre Antique d'Orange. This first-century Roman theater located in France has served several purposes in its nearly 2,000-year existence, including as a fort and prison.

Flag Facts

Our American flag has been flying for more than 240 years and has quite the story to tell.

Kid wonder. Our current version of the flag was created by a high school student for a history project. In 1958, Robert G. Heft designed the 50-star flag—a year before Alaska or Hawaii officially became states, though rumor was that they would both join the United States before long. Heft's teacher, however, gave him poor marks for counting and said Heft could save his grade if he could convince the government to accept his design. Two years later, Heft got a call from President Eisenhower: his flag was in. (And yes, his teacher did increase his grade, though by this time Heft had graduated!)

Lunar legacy. Six American flags have been placed on the moon. An American astronaut has planted the flag for each of the six lunar missions, bringing the Stars and Stripes to space.

The tried and true Red, White and Blue. Our pennant's colors are as symbolic as the numbers of stars and stripes. Red was chosen for valor and bravery, white for purity and innocence, and blue for vigilance, perseverance and justice.





A Juicy Journey Through Stone Fruits

If you're looking for a healthier option to satisfy a sweet craving, swap the sugar for a juicy stone fruit. What classifies as a stone fruit? Any fleshy fruit with a hard pit or "stone" inside. Known for their sweetness and juiciness, stone fruits are a staple summertime refreshment.

Hall of fame. The most popular stone fruits include peaches, plums, cherries,

nectarines, mangoes and apricots. Some surprise stone fruits? Raspberries, olives and coconuts!

The pits. Did you know? That pit inside is actually a seed. So what would happen if you planted it? You'd grow a tree! But the fruit your tree would yield would be a hybrid variety from the fruit it came from.

The good stuff. Stone fruits are packed with vitamin C, which supports the immune system and encourages collagen production. Plus, stone fruits are full of fiber, which coincidentally helps you feel full, too.

Stone fruits are best enjoyed when they're ripe.



Before you head outdoors to enjoy some sunshine this summer, make sure your eyes are protected with the proper sunglasses.

Block UV rays. Choose sunglasses that reduce exposure to ultraviolet rays. Look for those that have 100% UV protection. Blocking UV rays can slow the development of cataracts and age-related macular degeneration. A sticker or tag on the sunglasses should state that the lenses protect from both UVA and UVB rays.

Fit matters. Oversized sunglasses or those that wrap around the sides of the head offer the most coverage for

your eyes.

Cut the glare. Polarized lenses that cut down on glare from water, sand or pavement are popular, but make sure the label also lists UV protection.

Pick a color. Sunglass lenses come in an assortment of colors, but gray is most common. Amber or green lenses can increase contrast, which may be useful if you play outdoor sports. Choose according to your preference, but remember there is no relationship between color and UV protection.

1799: French soldiers make a discovery that helps scholars decode Egyptian hieroglyphics. The Rosetta Stone—so named for the town near which it was found—includes the same text in Greek and Egyptian, providing the key necessary to unlock the meaning of the picture-based hieroglyphs.

1826: Former Presidents Thomas Jefferson and John Adams both die on the Fourth of July, half a century after each man signed the Declaration of Independence.

1847: The United States Post Office introduces the first postage stamps: a five-cent stamp featuring Benjamin

Franklin and a 10-cent stamp honoring George Washington.
